SAKG STUDENT GARDEN REPORT


In the last lesson of Term 3 our focus was on companion planting. In companion gardening we plant plants that work well together and don't hurt each other. We plant plants together because...

- -some plants attract the good bugs and keep away the bad bugs. -some plants provide shade or a structure for the smaller plants to climb up.
- -some plants release nutrients in to the ground like nitrogen which helps other plants.

We were given a page of information. We used this information to plan which plants to plant next to each other. We then added these plants to the straw bale garden.

Did you know that tomato's planted next to carrots can stunt their growth.

Did you know peas and beans don't like onions, chives and garlic. Did you know companion planting is popular in the northern hemisphere.

This weeks lessons focus is Mulching and we looked at some of the different things we can use for mulching and the reasons why we mulch.

- Mulch puts moisture back into the soil
- Mulch stops weeds from popping up and taking the space for the other plants to grow
- Mulch sometimes helps put nutrients back into the soil
- Mulch helps keep the soil warmer during the winter
- Different types of Mulch used in our school are shredded bark, old straw, pea straw, rocks, gravel and wood chips.







DYSLEXIA AWARENESS MONTH

October is Dyslexia Awareness Month. So, what is dyslexia?

Dyslexia is a neurological difference and can have a significant impact during education, in the workplace and in everyday life. As each person is unique, so is everyone's experience of dyslexia. It can range from mild to severe, and it can co-occur with other learning differences. It usually runs in families and is a life-long condition. It is important to remember that there are positives to thinking differently. Many dyslexic people show strengths in areas such as reasoning and in visual and creative fields.

Dyslexia is a learning difference which primarily affects reading and writing skills. It can be remediated with appropriate intervention, but some difficulties may still persist. Phoneme awareness instruction linked to systematic decoding and spelling instruction, is key in supporting skill development. Dyslexic people may have difficulty processing and remembering information they see and hear, which can affect learning and the acquisition of literacy skills. Dyslexia can also impact on other areas such as organisational skills.

So, take the time to understand their difficulties. Although students with dyslexia may struggle with spelling or reading, it has nothing to do with the level of intelligence. Sometimes being dyslexic can be overwhelming, so offer encouragement, build in breaks and go back to activities later if needed. Remember their strengths and celebrate this too.

This month, classes have a variety of activities to get involved in to support developing dyslexia awareness, including a short video and a design project.

CURRICULUM NEWS

Year 1 Art

Our Year 1 students have been looking at different art works and different artists throughout the year. They were introduced to the work of Claude Monet and have created some art works which were inspired by his paintings.

Year 2 Music

Last term our Year 2 students did some hands-on learning of music theory and practice by learning how to play the recorder. This term they have moved on to work with the xylophone.

Year 2 UOI

The Year 2 classes have begun a new unit of inquiry looking at materials and how they change.

Central Idea: Materials can be changed in a variety of ways to meet different needs

Lines of Inquiry:

- How materials can be combined
- Ways forces cause change
- Permanent and temporary changes

They carried out some hands-on experiments to introduce them to the idea of force. They will be investigating different forces throughout the unit and the changes caused by these forces.

Year 4 Maths

Our Year 4 classes are looking at something a little different with maths to start this term. They are working on measurement and students have been encouraged to take on responsibility for their own learning with this unit. They have looked at the Australian Curriculum outcomes and what they need to know about measurement. From here they have chosen different areas of measurement to find out about and taken part in elective groups on different topics to develop their understanding.
