NEW BUILDING

<u>Warrinthi</u> - There are only a few things left to tidy up with this project and we expect to have full access from the start of Week 5. Yr 5 and Yr 6 students have been orienting themselves with their new spaces during this week and working out where best to locate furniture and what the best pathways for access/egress are.

While the build has taken a little longer than expected, the new spaces will be wonderful in the way they will support student learning in a variety of modes – singular, small group, medium groups and large groups.

<u>Tanta Marta</u> – The refurbishment of the heritage space is coming along and we still expect this to be fully operational from the start of the 2022 school year. Similarly to the Warrinthi build, Tanta Marta will provide flexibility and space for students to collaborate and engage in a variety of modes.

Sometime in November we anticipate that air-conditioning will go into the Taikondi space and as soon as we get the keys to Tanta Marta we will be re-carpeting the Taikondi space as well.

<u>Car Park</u> - Following on from the Warrinthi build we are redeveloping the Daly Street carpark. The plan will be to create more spaces for parking, more 'set down' spots and a better flow of traffic generally. We'd anticipate that it is going to take few months to complete but work has begun and together with the opening up of the East Terrace property on to East Terrace, we anticipate much better parking and traffic flow.

A reminder that all cars parking in School Lane or on the top deck area should exit via the house block onto East Terrace.



<u>Grand Opening</u> - At this stage we are planning for a 'grand opening' of all three of these projects sometime around Week 5 Term 1 2022 with a big celebration and gathering. Stay tuned. A sincere thanks to our school community for your patience with all of these projects. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to ask.

Pesto is usually made of basil but we decided to give it a twist and use warrigul greens instead along with some, garlic, parmesan cheese, a tip of olive oil , salt and along with some pine nuts.

Pesto is a topping mainly used for pasta witch gives a sweet lemony flavour. Pesto can be used with many meals such as: a dip, a topping for meat, on pizzas and you can so use it in soup.

WARIGAL GREEN PESTO RECIPE

50g pepitas, roasted

1-2 cloves garlic

250g Warrigal Greens

125ml olive oil

100g grated parmesan cheese (or vegan alternative)

Salt and pepper to taste

Wash and blanch the Warrigal green leaves in boiling water with a tablespoon of olive oil for 60 seconds. (This gets rid of the oxalic acid present in all raw spiniches.

Drain and cool in a bath of iced water to preserve the bright green colour.

Squeeze the excess water out of the leaves. Discard water onto the garden once cooled.

Blend in a food processor - Warrigal greens, nuts and garlic.

Slowly add in the oil and cheese.

Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Changes caused by heat


Challenges with using, storing and transferring heat
