It will help remember who and whose I am.

WORKING WITH CHILDREN CHECKS (WWCC)

Helping keep children safe through new screening laws.

Stronger, more effective and transparent screening laws for people working or volunteering with children have been introduced in South Australia.

The new screening laws were recommended as part of federal and South Australian royal commissions, to help keep children safe in our communities.

From 1 July 2019, the state's current system for child-related employment screening will be replaced with a working with children check (WWCC).

The new laws mean that, from 1 July 2019, everyone working or volunteering with children must have a valid child-related check.

Under the new scheme, people can apply for a WWCC themselves, as opposed to the previous system where organisations had to initiate screening applications. This means people looking to enter child-related work industries can be work-ready.

A WWCC is valid for five years and is portable across roles and organisations throughout South Australia.

Current, valid child-related employment screening checks done by DHS/DCSI will be recognised as a WWCC until they expire.

There will be a 12 month transition period for most people affected by the new laws – such as those people with a National Police Certificate assessed by their organisation – to allow them to enter the new WWCC scheme smoothly.

The Primary Years Program

Engaging with the community: Year 6 program

Our Year 6 students have been involved in planting a **bush tucker garden** and they will be looking after this as part of their garden lessons. A variety of native food plants were planted in a couple of locations near the new wall/fence on Lyndoch Rd.

Logs seats have been placed around the fire which is a great location for small groups to meet.

Our Year 2 students were involved in the planning of this garden as part of their unit on community spaces and how they are designed.

Yundamurra and Nadia (from Red Centre Enterprises and the Niina Marni Café at the Gawler Civic Centre) joined us with Yundamurra sharing his story and information about Bush Tucker foods with the Year 6 students and with Paxton and Jack from Year 2.



The Primary Years Program (PYP)

Relevant, Engaging, Significant, Challenging... - Year 5

Providing students with real world problems to solve, allows students to understand concepts and how they look in real life.

Our Year 5 students have been looking at measurement in their maths sessions and finding out costs for the upgraded garden area. This has involved applying what they know about measurement to help solve problems.



Local and Global – Year 4

A major focus of the International Baccalaureate is international-mindedness and the understanding that our school community and local community are part of a much wider world. Changes in technology and the way we communicate and do business mean that we have more to do with people in other parts of the world than ever before and this will increasingly be the case.

Our Year 4 classes are looking into this idea, studying a unit of inquiry about where we live and how this affects us. They have been looking at reasons people live in Gawler and they have been contrasting the way we live in Gawler to the way people live in other parts of the world, with a focus on some of the factors that might make the lives of people in other parts of the world similar or different to ours.

Central Idea

Location affects how we live our lives

Lines of inquiry

- Aspects of location
- Ways we adapt to our location
- Connections between location and culture

This week they created Jonesopolis and Daviesville in the Year 4 classrooms, building spaces to cater for the types of needs people might have in different places.



AUSTRALIAN LUTHERAN WORLD SERVICE (ALWS)

Australian Lutheran World Service is an agency of the Lutheran Church of Australia whose campaign is to help and support families who live in poverty or in refugee camps across the world.

Throughout the year ALWS team members visit local schools and churches to teach us about living in poverty.

On Monday 5 June, Julie Krause from ALWS visited Immanuel school and spent the day with all the year 5's and year 6's. We experienced what it was like to live like a refugee. We experienced the limited amount and type of food these people might eat. We ate oats (porridge) and water for recess and lentils and flatbread for lunch. Thank you to Mrs Eckermann, a group of parent volunteers and to Abi Sharp and Eva Rousoss for helping with the catering of the food.

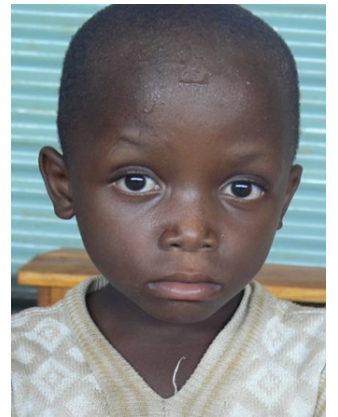
Throughout the day we played some fun learning activities which helped us get a better understanding of what refugees or people in poverty do or what their life is like.

One of the activities was a memory game. We had to match a question with a picture. Another activity was obtaining a pack of restricted resources and creating a structure or object.

Julie Krause said to us "if the only things we said thanks for today was all that you got tomorrow, how many things would you have tomorrow?"

Who would you be if you lived their life? Help them to live their life today happily! Can you make this one kid out of many in the world smile?

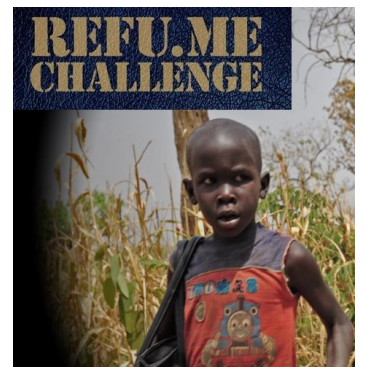
Refu.Me is a challenge. There are 10 challenges to complete.

Be Winter well with asthma

Many people experience an increase in asthma symptoms and find their asthma harder to control during Winter.

Among adults with asthma, emergency department presentations and hospitalisation rates peak during the Winter months and early Spring (June – September) which is likely due to the increase in respiratory infections and the annual Winter flu season.



There tend to be more asthma triggers around during the Winter season – including colder weather, colds and flu viruses, unhealthy eating habits and poor indoor air quality. So, if you experience an increase in your asthma symptoms over Winter, you're not alone. But, you don't need to put up with these symptoms.
